

DESIGN PRINCIPLES

"To imagine the NSC is to envision an oasis where thought and innovation blossom through the concrete—where every user activity paints a part of the larger picture."




Being outdoors is even better than being indoors

Outdoor spaces surpass the comfort and appeal of indoor environments, integrating elements like natural shade, wind corridors, comfortable seating, and scenic views. Use the NSC to mitigate the urban heat island effect, designing for nature rather than structure to create a softer and more sheltered environment.

Well-maintained

Maintain well-kept spaces to promote continued utilisation of the space and demonstrate a sense of pride in upkeeping the NSC.

"We should ensure continuity of the space, not have a big opening with cameras and then stop using the space within 3 months. We need to take care of the space and





Flexible spaces that encourage participation

Have multi-use or modular spaces that can be easily adapted and reconfigured for different purposes, such as community gatherings, markets, or recreational activities.

Reciprocal relationships with nature

The corridor to not just coexist with nature but to enhance the biodiversity and the greenery. This helps to showcase a symbiosis between urban development and the natural environment. The greenery also provides an escape and stress-free space for visitors.

Environments that encourage social interaction and are free from the distractions of digital technology. These communal spaces that promote face-to-face and serendipitous interactions.

Inclusive, seamless and accessible design

Ensure that all spaces are and feel accessible to individuals of varying ages and physical abilities—adequate rest points, entry / exit points. Safety for all is also top in mind.

> "Connectivity to the unique locals, connectivity begins from the home to the destination, if the path to the destination is not known to be "accessible" it will be difficult for users to imagine making a trip there."
